

The Parish of The Sacred Heart, Tisbury, and All Saints, Wardour Minutes of 2026 Annual General Meeting

7.00 p.m. Monday 8th June 2026 in the Parish Room

1. **Opening Prayer.** At 7.00 Mark Shuldham called the Meeting to order and invited Fr. Anthony Paris to open with prayer. Fr. Tomas Krejci was also present.
2. **Welcome and Apologies.** MS welcomed all those present. An apology for absence was received from Philip Conrath.
3. **Minutes of last year's Meeting on 13th May 2025**
4. **Matters arising from the Minutes.** This and the previous item were swiftly dealt with by MS. There was no discussion of the Minutes. He indicated that Matters Arising would be dealt with under their own heads, as later items on the agenda.
5. **Appointment/confirmation of PPC Members.** There were no new appointments. Jamie Clark, Anne Evans, Jenny Malone-Lee, Chris von Patzelt, Chris Roddis, MS, Robert Vaux, Catherine Vaux, Corinne Williams and Nick Wright were willing to continue as Members, with Frederick Dunstan as Hon. Sec. Izzy Sepp had communicated her intention of stepping down from the PPC, and Ali Hillyard was understood, in her absence, to wish to do the same. MS thanked them and all the serving Members.
6. **Reports.**

(a) Wardour School, by the Chairman of the Governors, Patrick Craig-McFeely:

Wardour School Parish Presentation for June 2026

The school is flourishing with numbers of pupils increasing to be almost at our capacity of 105. We can never be certain until the last moment as parents can change their mind, and it is always worthwhile for parents of children they would like to come to Wardour to look around the school and express an interest. We follow the Diocese Admissions Policy which is on our website.

Mrs Dixon is leaving the school after eighteen years here and eight as our hugely successful and popular headteacher. We are so grateful for everything she has done and wish her the very best in the future. We have just appointed Mrs Amy Allen as our next headteacher to start in September 2026. You may have seen her in Mass. She has been a teacher at Wardour for some years after a career in banking. The Holy Spirit has been looking over us as we have been able to appoint an excellent candidate following our first round of applications.

Catholic Social Teaching is fully embedded in the school with the new and comprehensive Religious Education Directory taught to all year groups. Many thanks to the

parishioners and the Parish Social Group who bought thirty Bibles of the version used for the new RE curriculum. The children are active in many parish events, and all parishioners are warmly invited to the Leavers' Mass in All Saints' Chapel, Wardour at 0930 on Tuesday 14 July 2026. Bishop Bosco MacDonald will celebrate that Mass and will visit the school immediately afterwards.

The children's educational outcomes remain excellent, and they continue to have a rich variety of additional activities including a Christmas visit last year by the whole school to the ballet, Sleeping Beauty. There are too many to list, but anyone can access the weekly newsletter on the school website to be amazed by everything going on. It also says if a class is going to the Tuesday morning Wardour Mass where their presence makes the service even more special.

Parishioners can get involved with the school in other ways. Vacancies for new governors come up. You can see the present ones on the school website and any of us would be happy to tell you more about the role. Governors set the vision and strategy for the school, monitor educational outcomes, finances and engagement with stakeholders. The school has some voluntary roles (like hearing children read) and welcomes enquiries directly to the school business manager (see school website). Once you get known you may get invited to accompany groups of children to external events – a great way to fill in gaps from your own school time when these were less common.

The new education White Paper published earlier this year emphasised the importance of collaboration. Wardour already does this with a group of seven local primary schools and in a different group of Catholic primary and secondary schools. This relationship will be strengthened and formalised at some point when we are able to follow the wishes of Bishop Bosco to join the Dunstan Catholic Education Trust. This has been discussed for over a decade and is progressing slowly. Wardour school won't change but we will be part of a larger and supportive organisation we can call on as required.

Highlighting a few items in this report, PC-McF emphasized that the School is now doing extremely well, and that Sacred Heart/Wardour parishioners should not be deterred, from the School's being almost at capacity, from expressing an interest in a place for their child. Mrs Emma Dixon has been an absolutely superb headteacher and is leaving the School at its most thriving. Catholic social teaching comprises 10% of the curriculum. Parishioners are invited to attend Mass on 14th July, when Bishop Bosco Macdonald will be presiding, to look at the school website and be amazed at the incredible range of school activities, and to consider offering their services as Governors or in other voluntary roles.

MS warmly thanked PC-McF for his report, calling it 'all joyful news'.

(b) Parish Accounts by Robert Vaux (Treasurer):

Treasurer's report for AGM 8th June 2026 Report on year ending 31st December 2025

A summary income and expenditure account for the year ending 31st December 2025 is attached. The figures for the previous two years are included, to allow comparison. Thanks to

some catching up with claiming Gift Aid tax refunds, we ended the year with a small (£2,623) surplus. Special purpose fundraising, including grants, totalled £20,345, of which £10,669 was spent (£7,910 on Sacred Heart bell and £2,759 on new vestments). The £9,260 remaining at the year-end is held in a restricted fund for the West End House refurbishment, and £416 in a fund towards the purchase of Gospel books.

Offertory received in 2025 was virtually identical to that for 2024. Similarly, expenditure in 2025 was very similar to that in 2024, except that our Parish Share contribution increased by £6,000 to £19,307. The 2025 Share was based on the financial figures for 2023, the first full post-Covid year. The Share for 2026 (based on 2024 figures) is set at £19,715.

Grants towards the West End House project (contained within the restricted fund of £9,260) include £4,800 from the Benefact Trust, and £300 from Tisbury Parish Council.

Report on period up to 31st May 2026

Since the year end, a further £5,000 grant has been received into the Restricted Buildings fund from the Harold Hood Foundation, towards the West End House project, together with a £1,000 grant from Wiltshire Area Boards. A further £61,310 has also been received in donations towards the project. £4,325 (including £345 Building Control fees) has been spent on the removal of the partition wall in the Parish Room. £1,220 has been paid so far in professional fees.

Also since the year end, a further set of vestments, a Marian set, has been purchased for £600, also fully funded by donations. In addition, 30 copies of the Children's edition of the English Standard Version (Catholic Edition) Bible have recently been purchased for Wardour School, fully funded by individual donations by parishioners.

Income and expenditure since the start of 2026 has been very broadly in line with budget, with the prospect of ending the year with a small deficit. Expenditure has included £7,462 spent from unrestricted funds for a replacement boiler for Sacred Heart Church.

RV gave a huge ‘thank-you’ for the special purchases mentioned in his report: the refurbishment of the Sacred Heart bell, the six new sets of vestments and the children’s Bibles for Wardour School (mentioned in PC-McF’s report). All these had been covered by donations. He went on to focus on the main concern arising from the report. Over the last six years we have been consistently spending slightly more than our income, although last year was an exception to this year-on-year tendency. Many of us have set up standing orders for giving; he stressed the importance of *all* parishioners doing this: nothing, he emphasized, is as good as a monthly standing order!

He thanked Adele Cordle for her work as Gift Aid Officer over the last 12 months, and Chris Roddis and Nigel Knowles for helping him count the offertory every two weeks.

There were no questions. MS thanked RV for all his hard work.

(c) Fabric and Finance, with Health and Safety

MS introduced his own Report on behalf of the Fabric and Finance Committee:

Regular gutter clearance.

West End House and Parish Room

The final design and specification details have been agreed.

The current layout has been redesigned to achieve:

1st Floor: Kitchen, opening into large sitting-room at front, larger bathroom at rear

2nd Floor: Double bedroom, single bedroom.

The insulation and lighting upgrades required will include work on the Parish Room walls and the ceiling lights.

The contract has been awarded to Armacre at a cost of £189,055 incl 20% VAT

We now have funds totalling £215,000. These consist of our own Reserves of £93,000 and £122,000 which the Diocese has agreed to release from the Parsons Fund. Our own Reserves were boosted by a most generous gift of £60,000 (from a parishioner).

This means that we shall not have a repayable loan hanging over us and it is also possible that the VAT element may be reduced if a Treasury Concession (on unoccupied buildings in a Conservation Area) can be obtained.

All this has been achieved with the great help and support of Mike Riding and Tony Coyle in the Salisbury office, and the help and co-operation of the Diocese. At our end Robert Vaux has led all the effort and negotiations to achieve this.

MS reminded the Meeting that at this time last year, the funds for the necessary upcoming works had not been secured. The good news was that now, after a great deal of work by RV and some generous support from Deanery and Diocese, the money for the renovation of the West End House flat was now in place! Beyond this, there is plenty more work to be undertaken, chiefly repairs on the church and gardens – some of the jobs have been costed, others not. In response to a question about the upgrading of the lights within Sacred Heart church, he said that the present ones are noisy and throw too much glare on the altar. Fr. T confirmed this, and said that sometimes he himself just switches them off. MS said the lights will be upgraded if we can afford it. He confirmed that once the works on the West End House flat are finished, it will be rented out on the open market so as to obtain the best return possible. It's not known how long the Parish Room itself will be unavailable for use, while the works are done, but everyone will be notified. He also mentioned the damp-proofing of the ground floor and in particular the kitchen area.

Chris Roddis then introduced the Health and Safety Report:

H&S Report (AGM June 2026)

In addition to weekly and monthly Fire and Safety checks the bulk of H&S activity is driven by the requirement to complete the ongoing list of routine tasks detailed in the Diocese Safety Toolbox, which provides an online record as well as a calendar of when safety tasks are due. These have included:

- The annual inspection and certification of all Portable Electrical Appliances Testing (PAT) in the Church, Parish Rooms and Presbytery on 21st Nov 2025.
- The annual Fire Alarm Test and Inspection of the Presbytery and Parish Room.
- The annual Fire Extinguisher Service on 6th Nov 2025. Two extinguishers replaced as over 5 years old.
- The annual Fire Risk Assessment review.
- The Emergency Lighting Annual Discharge test in the Church.
- Annual boiler inspections and certification in Oct 2025.
- The Asbestos Monitoring Review of all parishes, coordinated by the Clifton Diocese H&S team, was carried out by G&L Consultancy on 22nd Oct 2025 and based on the February 2022 major Asbestos Survey.

- The inspection of mature trees in the Church and Trellis House grounds was carried out by Bawden Tree Care on 18th April. The report recently received (29th May) highlighted three items requiring further attention.

Outstanding Checks

While some accessible parts of the guttering of West End House have been cleared the bulk of the inspection/cleaning remains outstanding pending the commencement of refurbishment work.

J M-L described the events listed in her report, dwelling on the successful Lent lunches, and mentioning the refreshments served after First Holy Communion on 31st May. The next event to be catered for would be the Patronal Festival on Friday 12th June. She appealed, once again, for more people to think about joining the Social Committee.

MS thanked JM-L and the Committee for doing a fantastic job and clarified that they had also raised money for the Wardour Bibles.

(e) Catechesis and Pastoral Report by Catherine Vaux (Catechist and Parish Co-ordinator):

This year the Parish has two Year 8 young people who have prepared for Confirmation at St Osmund's with Father Joseph, CV and other catechists. Sessions have been monthly and on other Wednesdays they are welcome to join in with the Youth Club which Harriet has each week. The Confirmation group went to Buckfast for the retreat weekend in January. From our Parish we were helped by Jamie Clark and Robert Vaux. Confirmation is on June 11th in Salisbury at St Gregory's where Christ the King and St George's candidates will join the 23 of ours. It will be packed! Father Tomas and Deacon Michael will be there too.

The programme for First Holy Communion has followed a pattern of parent led guided lessons at home and a monthly session with me at Sacred Heart. We have met in the Lady Chapel as the Parish Rooms are filled with parishioners for after Mass refreshments. The First Holy Communion Mass was last Sunday, 31st May at Wardour and was filled with joy and awe. The six were attentive and prayerful. We have had lots of appreciation and thanks from the 190 who attended. Our numbers at Sacred Heart were slightly lower than normal but together we saw 265 attending Mass. Praise be to God!

Our monthly Youth Masses at Sacred Heart 9am Mass have been well supported. Father Anthony celebrates these when he can and families are keen to join in. We have great readers, servers and Offertory procession helpers.

Children's liturgy is always available if there are young ones who need that. Please let us know and it will be laid on. We have several parishioners ready to help.

Servers at Mass: Claire Sheppard looks after the servers and encourages the group to serve as often as possible. We have begun Guild of St Stephen and our three longest serving servers have been awarded the bronze medal.

Emma and Louisa Lavan organise the Offertory procession (usually children) at 9am Mass beautifully. We thank them deeply for their ministry.

Admin wise- the Office is looked after by CV, RV and Rachel. The newsletter is prepared by CV, dispersed by email (240) and Rachel prints 35 copies and the Intercessions as well as

parish window/noticeboard copies. Messages and emails are answered usually within hours of receiving. We work closely with the Salisbury Office.

The Parish data base update has stalled as parishioners have not registered on PAMIS. In doing so we are hampered as we cannot efficiently send information out electronically as well as store dates and other details useful in being pastoral.

The annual Statistic returns were prepared by Treasurer and Coordinator.

Holy Communion is taken to nine parishioners by EMHCs

The Charity fete is on June 20th, organised by Becky. Parishioners are encouraged to run a stall for a charity.

With many commitments, Becky has stepped down from being our Safeguarding Representative. We all thank her hugely for all she has done to ensure our wellbeing and safety. Ed Gairdner is our new Representative. There is some training for those who are Level 3 coming up in August.

Our Patronal Feast of Sacred Heart is on Friday 12th June and will begin with Mass followed by refreshments. Do come!

CV May 2026

CV asked for more people to help with stalls for the charity fete on June 20th.

She praised those who had taken part in the First Holy Communion Mass. The Corpus Christi procession on the following Sunday had been lovely.

Becky Davies has been a wonderful safeguarding representative and is now standing down.

MS thanked CV for all that she does.

(f) Wardour Chapel. Richard Arundell presented this report:

Report from Wardour Chapel Trust

WCT have made an application to the National Heritage Lottery Fund for funding to repair the roof and conserve the plasterwork Dome above the altar, which is cracking and unstable. The Trustees have commissioned surveys from structural engineers, architects and conservation professionals. These reports show that action must be taken to halt the decline of the roof and Dome. The cost of the project amounts to just under £4 million and we are expected to provide 10% of this overall figure. The application to NHLF went in at the end of May and we expect to hear back from the Lottery Fund at the end of September this year. If successful we progress to another phase of the application process, known as the Delivery Stage. If this is successful we would start work on the building in the spring of 2028, with the aim of completing the works in April 2029, coinciding with the 250th anniversary of Catholic emancipation. We are incredibly grateful for the help and support that parishioners have already given in our endeavour.

In the meantime Wardour continues to be used for twice weekly Masses, baptisms, weddings and funerals. Tours and Days of Recollection have taken place in the last year and Wardour School continues to use the Chapel for weekly Masses and its annual Carol Service.

RA said an out-of-date report might have been circulated by mistake, but it was confirmed that the report which has been sent out was the correct one. He spoke about the decaying plasterwork of the dome of the chapel and the compromised roof. The professional fundraiser who has been employed, at some cost, recommended an application to the National Heritage Lottery Fund. This application was made in May, thanks to the Wardour Chapel Trustees working phenomenally hard to get it completed, and the result will be announced in September. The application had to show public benefit, and as a result plans have been made to make the Chapel more open and available. If the bid is successful, 10% of the slightly-under-£4 million will have to be raised by us. A member of the audience mentioned the Government's recent announcement of the Places of Worship Renewal Fund. RA confirmed that the fundraiser is aware of this.

MS thanked RA for bringing us up to date on the subject of the Chapel repairs.

(g) Wardour Cemetery. MS ran through a Report by Jamie Ryan, the Chairman of the Cemetery Trustees:

Wardour Cemetery Report

Ground Works & Maintenance

The cemetery has been kept in good order. Grass cutting carried out periodically.

Bramble clearance, ivy control & hedge cutting carried out last autumn. New elm trees (disease resistant strain) survived last year's drought. Monitoring of cemetery trees will continue.

An ash tree in the New Cemetery is now looking better & so will not be removed for the time being.

Financial Report

For the Financial Year to 31 Mar 26 details are as follows:

Income was £3,444

Expenditure was £1,814, largely maintenance work.

There were no questions about the cemetery.

7. **Questions/matters from the floor.** MS explained that this item was to allow Members to express concerns, or to share thoughts on mission, or the way forward. However, as nobody appeared to have anything urgent to say, he passed straight on to the next item.
8. **Fr. Anthony.** Invited by MS to speak, Fr. Anthony Paris stated that we, as the St Edith's Pastoral Area (Deanery), are now in a significantly better place than we were five years ago, when there were real fears that the parishes of Amesbury, Warminster and Tisbury might have to close. Deacon Terry Aspell is in Residence in Warminster, Fr. Renjith (George) James is in Amesbury, with the presbytery there having been refurbished significantly, and here in Tisbury we have Fr. T who is a pastor of the Ordinariate. Within the Pastoral Area there are six churches, two chapels of ease, four Catholic schools and close to 30 care homes. The Deanery mission focus is on the care of younger people, with clergy getting into all the schools; contact with the young folk also enables contact with parents and families, and the clergy profiles are being raised. The older folk are not being neglected: Fr. A spends most of his personal time with the housebound and in care homes. Congregation numbers are high and the trend is upwards. It was commented that such a full congregation had never been seen as at the First Communion service at Wardour two weeks ago, when the Chapel was filled to capacity with 190 present.

CV's organising work, over the St. Edith area, and all her youth work, were affirmed. Deacon Michael Hughes added that Our Lady, Mother of the Church, must be looking after us. He expressed deep gratitude towards the Ordinariate and to CV for taking some of the Priest's admin load.

On the subject of communications, appreciation of Fr. A's newsletters (or 'billy-doo's' as he called them) was expressed. The suggestion was made that Sacred Heart and Wardour might have a WhatsApp group. CV cautioned that some things are not permissible on WhatsApp. Fr. T said it would be useful for publicising events such as the unscheduled Masses that occasionally take place. He said it would be good if people were to sign up for a WhatsApp group. CV said that in the Salisbury Parish everyone was signed up to the PAMIS network, but not in Tisbury – here, she thought, people found it too intrusive. A member agreed that PAMIS is 'quite clunky' – he said it wants your life history, inside leg measurement, etc. Fr. A confirmed that it's used by more than 3,000 people in Salisbury and is indeed useful for the clergy. MS asked CV if it would make her life easier, and she said it would. She offered to assist parishioners in entering their details. The discussion ended without any resolution being taken.

On the subject of the sound system at Wardour Chapel, it was noticed that there has been some lack of audibility: a member requested that readers be encouraged to use the microphone correctly by positioning themselves closer to it. RA confirmed that the mouth should be a 'pipe-cleaner's distance' from the microphone. He agreed that there had been concern about inaudibility, but the system has been tested and found in fact to be working properly.

9. **Date of 2027 AGM.** MS accepted that it was not possible at this stage to finalise a date for next year's AGM, but desired agreement that it should be held in late April or early May. There was general agreement as to this.
