**Offertory**. As we gradually return to 'normal' now is a good time to consider what needs to be changed, what kept. During lockdown people were encouraged to make donations or weekly giving on-line or by Standing Order. Money given electronically spreads no virus! It is easier for the Treasurer to deal with. It fits better with the accounting practices encouraged by the diocese. And it means you don't have to see what your purse or wallet contains when you arrive at church! Those unprepared for a basket appearing under their noses can get very embarrassed.

Some still miss the basket collection, despite its disadvantages. The basket passed hand from hand puts pressure on people to put something in it. Why get rid of something that works? But does it? There are the weeks when attendance is low, and this is reflected in the contents of the basket. And since then, Gift Aid has come into our lives, with its own benefits to the Parish.

During lockdown a basket or two sat at the back of church. People used them generously. They were not passed around. Now we are allowed to have collections using baskets passed from hand to hand I think the sensitive and sensible way forward is to blend the schemes.

We continue to encourage giving online. If, like me, you heartily detest doing things online, it is easy to set up a Standing Order with your bank. Our Treasurer can advise. The bank then does all the work, there is a paper trail, no possible risk of germs, and no embarrassment at ignoring the basket when it passes you by at Mass because no basket will be thrust under your nose. As during lockdown, the basket(s) will remain at the back of church for those who prefer to give in cash. RM

This year marks 30 years since Alabaré was founded, with the vision of coming alongside the homeless and the vulnerable to offer them a safe home and support. 30 years of supporting people into fulfilling lives, reflecting Jesus's words, "I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." (John 10:10) We are so very grateful to you for all the support that you give us. It means so much to know that we are being held in the prayers of so many, not to mention the gifts of money, gifts and volunteering hours that we receive. Thank you so much.

As you know, 30 years on, the need is still great. Over this past year, with the help of our amazing supporters, Alabaré has supported 1389 people across our services and as the country moves into the next phase of the Covid pandemic, we expect the demand to increase. We are opening new homes in Weston super Mare and Chippenham and are increasing our services supporting those who are struggling with their mental health.
