Homily from Father Robert: Some parishioners, especially Wardour regulars, will remember Ronnie Bird. Ronnie hoped to make 100 but missed his century by just over three weeks, a reminder that we don't always get our wishes granted. He wanted a Requiem Mass using the Tridentine rite, as did his wife Joan, and his wish may yet be possible when the lock-down is lifted. Unfortunately his parish priest is rubbish at languages: at school thrown out of Latin after a year, German the same, and French failed three times with the bottom grade at O Level after six years of the subject. Before starting my final degree (the university thought this necessary) I was required to do a short course in medieval Latin at the CityLit. The lecturer staggered through most of term 1, going off sick for the rest of the year; man proposes, God disposes. Thankfully, interesting as it was, it proved unnecessary. We can't predict our future, only that worrying about it can bring it closer, and hasten the arrival of wrinkles and gray hairs.

For Latin Rite Masses, Fr Budge from Marnhull is usually able and always willing to oblige - and, at least at this stage, Ronnie was interred using his preferred rite. Ronnie's long years of service in Nigeria would have equipped him with other languages, too. The Lord himself spoke Aramaic. Latin speakers crucified Him. Latin speakers invaded our own country. The New Testament was written in Greek, and Greek was widely used in the worship of the early Christians. Perhaps because of my linguistic inadequacies, I have mixed feelings about Latin. My Anglican heritage familiarised me with Elizabethan English. When the old Prayer Book texts were revised, I missed the quirkiness, but gained much in understanding. At university, our Liturgy lecturer - unusually - really knew his stuff and showed us that the resemblance in language and in structure between most ancient texts and those we call Tridentine, were in places rather thin. The reforms of Vatican 2 were just coming in and I could see that their aim was to use what survives from the oldest liturgies. I learnt that in the Catholic Church, even mid 20th century, not a fact known to many, Latin was just one among 23 authorised liturgical languages. The changes meant that when I finally sought refuge in the Catholic Church, to my relief, I was not required to study Latin. Nor, for that matter, Aramaic, Glagolitic or any of some twenty other similar - yet not dead -languages. They are still alive today. The Church has spread widely since the first century AD. I type this on the day when the calendar names St Barnabas, a missionary apostle, among those called to initiate that spread. Like St Paul, he would have done so among mostly Latin, Greek or Hebrew speakers. Depending which part of the Roman empire he travelled in, Latin was the key to open doors in the West, Greek to the East, and beyond, all sorts of languages which sound strange to us. If you have access to a current Catholic Directory for England and Wales you will find, especially in the Archdiocese of Westminster, churches where some of those ancient and some more modern languages are spoken, for example Belarusian, Chaldean, Eritrean, Ethiopian, Knayan, Maronite, Syriac, Ukranian, Polish, French, Czech and more. Many of those rites depend upon the Latin text as their original, but some do not. I'm not sure what Ronnie has discovered in his place of rest, but God will understand our prayers for Ronnie, whatever language we use to pray. RM
