Homily from Father Robert: *Every day clergy, most members of religious orders, and many lay people say the Daily or Divine Office. A Psalm (119 v 164) says, 'seven times a day will I praise Thee'. From the earliest centuries the Church has broken up the day, and part of the night, by reciting the Psalms in rotation, adding prayers and readings, something learned from its Jewish parents. Buy a breviary (full version, or shorter) and you can join in that chain of prayer. In the last century, when services were revised, the Night Office (Matins, said in the small hours), and the seven Day Hours (Lauds, Prime, Terce, Sext, None, Vespers, Compline), some of which might be said together, were tidied up and - although some religious orders continue the ancient practice - appear in*

today's breviary as the Office of Readings, Morning Prayer, Prayer during the Day, Evening Prayer, the Night Office (Compline). Over a month all the Psalms are recited. Those familiar with the Church of England will know that in the 16th century these formed the bones of what are now usually referred to as Matins and Evensong.

This week the Government graciously allowed churches to be opened on a limited basis 'for prayer' but not yet for a service of any kind (which includes Exposition). On Monday we gathered a small band of volunteer stewards to run through the official conditions (under 70, known to the priest, familiar with Safeguarding, and a few other official requirements) to work in pairs when we open Sacred Heart on a limited basis, to see how it will work. Some optimists were forecasting a stampeding crowd. Those more familiar with the daily footfall expect otherwise. Either way, more volunteers would be welcome.

I write on Tuesday and, thanks to the labours (several hours each) of Trish Coopman and Robert Vaux at the computer, the diocesan Health & Safety Officer has allowed us to open the church, but only after completing two questionnaires (60+ questions) online; I am not joking, it really was thus! Anne Evans has drawn up a rota. At 1000 we open until noon. Numbers allowed in at any one time will be controlled - as at Tisbury's Co-op. You may drop in to say your Office or, as most do every day, at least the Our Father.

If you happened to say the Office of Readings yesterday, after saying your prayers outside the church building, perhaps in your garden or your home, you may have been struck by a passage from a treatise by St Cyprian (d 258), On the Lord's Prayer, as being extraordinarily apt for the Monday of the week when we can reopen for prayer, at least in some form. Cyprian wrote, 'Before all else the teacher of peace and of unity would not have us pray on our own and in private in such a manner that each prays only for himself. We do not say: "My Father, who art in heaven", or, "Give me this day my daily bread". Each person does not ask that his own sins only be forgiven, nor does he request for himself alone that he be not led into temptation and that he be delivered from evil. Our prayer is public, and when we pray, we pray not for a single person, but for the whole people, because we are all one'. He says further, 'What deep mysteries.... are contained in the Lord's Prayer!.... "This is how you must pray," the Lord says, "Our Father, who art in heaven".'
