Pope Francis' Month of May prayer intentions for Deacons (see article at the end of this newsletter)

Deacon Michael has written a 'homilette' for us:

"Then Jesus told them a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart" (Luke 18:1)

VE day was this Friday May 8th.

Our country fought, sometimes alone, against the mighty war machine of the Germans. Though there were always voices saying it was futile to continue to resist, we went on fighting. We endured. After years of struggle, we, with our American and other allies, liberated the peoples of Europe and stopped the genocide of the concentration camps.

We give thanks for those who fought, for those who were damaged and those who died, and for those who endured the rigours of wartime Britain. To bring about this victory over evil, Britain spent everything she had.

And now our country is again spending everything we have to overcome another enemy, the COVID virus. And once again, with continual prayer and stout hearts, we will be given grace to overcome.

The trouble is that after the war, somewhere in the years of rationing and poverty, and then the years of consumerist plenty, Christendom largely forgot God, forgot how to pray. Everyone marvelled at the cleverness of scientists and the technological advances of machines and computers. We knew everything, we had mastered the earth, and had no further need of God.

Recently we have learned two things. First: that we are fast destroying the planet on which we live: and seem unwilling to change our ways in order to preserve it. Second, that for all our cleverness, hundreds of thousands are dying and our economies are destroyed. We are powerless before something as small and insignificant as this miniscule virus, something similar to the common cold.

What we need to do is pray continually and never lose heart. Yet there are so few of us now who know anything of Jesus and His power to save: so few who ever pray. For us Christians, now is the time not only to redouble our prayers, but to encourage our families and friends to pray – perhaps at meals, perhaps on the 'phone.

And because God loves ALL his children, our prayers **will** be heard, and the world that comes after we have defeated the virus, will be one where the rich take better care of the poor, where justice protects the weak, and we all work to save this beautiful Earth that God has entrusted to us.

How joyous will be that day when that new, better Britain gives thanks to Almighty God for our deliverance from the results of mankind's folly and pride.

A spiritual exercise, excerpt taken from <u>Talking about Jesus</u> £4.95 Redemptorist Publications

We encourage you to sit in stillness for ten to fifteen minutes and open your heart to receive God's gift of the Holy Spirit.

This spiritual exercise will deepen your awareness of the presence of the Holy Spirit in your heart and give you confidence that the Spirit will be with you in everything you do to make Christ known.

- Centre yourself; sit upright, two feet firmly on the floor; breathe rhythmically with deep breaths, in and out, from the abdomen; clear your mind of all preoccupations.
- 2. Bring yourself to bodily stillness.
- 3. Now welcome in your heart this gift that Jesus has for you: "*Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid*" (John 14:27).
- 4. Quietly repeat those words of Jesus and hand over to him all worries or trouble.
- 5. You may find it helpful if you name to God a specific area where you need healing or forgiveness.
- 6. Now be still for some time in the presence of God as you welcome the Holy Spirit into your heart.
- 7. As you are about to finish your time of prayer, focus again on your breathing while you relax in God's presence.
- 8. Bring yourself gently back to your daily concerns.

May you receive that peace of Christ each day.

The new Pope Video has just been published, to make known the prayer intention that the Holy Father has entrusted to the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network. This month, it is about

deacons, "the guardians of service in the Church" and of a renewed apostolate in today's world. Pope Francis exhorts us to pray for them, that they may be "an invigorating symbol for the entire Church."

The ecclesiastical ministry, which is the ministry of men dedicated to God's service, includes three degrees of the sacrament of Orders: bishops, priests, and deacons. "Deacons share in Christ's mission and grace in a special way. The sacrament of Holy Orders marks them with an imprint ('character') which cannot be removed and which configures them to Christ, who made himself the 'deacon' or servant of all." They are ordained ministers and a sign, in the heart of the Church, of Christ the Servant. In fact, the Greek word diakonía means service, and this is the spirit that defines their function: they help through the service to the Word, service of the liturgy, and service to the poorest and most disadvantaged. In the Pope's words, "They are dedicated to the service of the poor, who carry within them the face of the suffering Christ."

Not everyone knows that priests are ordained deacons for service to the community; it's even less known that permanent deacons, who also live according to the charism and vocation of service to others, are married and live "their vocation in and with their family." Today, there are more than 46,000 permanent deacons throughout the world.

Fr Frédéric Fornos SJ, International Director of the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network (which includes the Eucharistic Youth Movement-EYM), comments that "Jesus, in his last hours with his disciples, revealed himself as the servant of God par excellence. His last words became actions when he washed his disciples' feet, as recorded in the Gospel according to Saint John. It was his testament. He is revealed as the Suffering Servant (see Is 52:13-53:12). All of his life was service: service to the poorest and most vulnerable. This is how Jesus understood his own life, as Saint Matthew tells us: 'The Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many' (Mt 20:17-28). In the Church, we should all incarnate this attitude of service. Deacons, symbols in the Church of Christ the Servant, remind us of this. As Francis tells us, they are 'an invigorating symbol for the entire Church.' The Church needs them."

Speaking from the UK office of the Pope's Prayer Network in St Ignatius, Stamford Hill, National Director Fr David Stewart SJ said: "as we're seeing during these difficult days so many examples of service of others, especially those less able to look after themselves, it's good to be reminded by this Pope Video of the essential sacredness of service; it's at the heart of the priesthood that all the baptised share"."

In point 104 of the Final Document of the Synod of Bishops on the Amazon, the pope says: "Today's diaconate should also promote integral ecology, human development, social pastoral work, and service to those in situations of vulnerability and poverty; modelled on Christ the Servant and becoming a merciful, Samaritan, solidarity and diaconal Church." Let us pray, as Pope Francis invites us in The Pope Video, that all deacons, "faithful in their service to the Word and the poor, may be an invigorating symbol for the entire Church."
