Live-Streaming Project - Update from Fr Michael

I am truly delighted to be able to report that, thanks to the generosity of parishioners, we have now reached our target of £3692.65 to pay for the cameras, installation and necessary technical infrastructure to support the live-streaming of Mass via our website. There will be an ongoing annual cost to the parish (for the licence, technical support and webhosting services) but we have now raised enough to get the service up and running. Thank you very much to everyone who has responded so generously.



I am also greatly encouraged by the number of emails and notes of interest and support that I have received and the excitement around this project that I have encountered. When I wrote my message to you about this a couple of weeks ago, I explained that it was a project initially motivated by a desire to support the housebound, the infirm and those for whom it is difficult to get to Mass. Through my conversations with you, I am coming to realise that there are a great number of personal circumstances in which this will support you in your faith. One parishioner has spoken to me about occasionally not being able to get to Mass because she is on 'grandparent duty'; others who are in good health cannot get to Mass because they are the main carer for a relative or loved one who cannot be left unattended, leaving them isolated from the parish community they love and would wish to draw support from. One housebound parishioner reported to us that they have, on occasion, watched Mass streamed from another parish but they just didn't feel 'connected' to it and so they are now eagerly awaiting Mass from their own parish. This initiative will bring an experience of our parish Mass right into the living rooms of our parishioners. I am also delighted to hear from some of our parishioners with family in other countries that their overseas relatives would dearly love to see and experience liturgies that involve their relatives here in Salisbury. We will be connecting with families world-wide and in this way extend our parish family.

When will the service be launched?

The question I'm now being repeatedly asked is 'When?!!' It is our hope that the service will be up and running by Sunday 15 July. If you haven't yet visited our website - this is an ideal time to do so - become acquainted with it in readiness for the launch of this project. Visit : **www.salisburycatholics.org**

If you would like to receive the Mass in your home on your television set, we are hoping that boxes or USB units will be available so that you can receive the service that way. This is something we are currently investigating. To receive the service you will need to have broadband internet provision to your home.

As part of our outreach to the elderly and housebound and to support them in accessing this service, we are currently recruiting, training and DBS-checking volunteers who will be able to offer practical and technical support where necessary. POPE FRANCIS - The importance of Information with Respect

At a time when everyone speaks and steps in, but not everyone is willing to listen and reflect, the role of professional information is more necessary than ever. Today, social media are universally available tools and represent a great opportunity to people. But it is precisely this growing information offers and web spaces that makes the role of professional journalists and quality journalism even more important.

A journalism that not only respects the rules of professional ethics, trying to offer good information, but that can also propose, in the difficult context in which we live, information that is good: made of insights and comparison, always respectful of the people 's dignity.

An information that does not fall into sterile contrasts, into superficiality, into chatter. An information that does not settle for describing only what is already in the spotlight, that does not forget the dramatic situations of which no one speaks, and that does not tire of telling with sensitivity and humanity the stories of people, with particular attention to the defenseless, the last, the discarded, those who have no power.

Information able to tell the complexity of the reality in which we live, without giving in to easy schematism and propaganda.

FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Jesus finds himself rejected in this Sunday's Gospel... not by strangers but by those close to him and by those who know him. Maybe it's because Jesus is too familiar to them; maybe he's too ordinary for them and they were expecting something different. If the mission of Jesus is our mission too, if we look out onto our world with the eyes and mind of the Lord, then surely rejection is something we will face. How can God work through *you*? Why would God choose *you*? Because God does and he chooses the ordinary and the familiar to speak to us and to reach out to us. Paul recognises not just his own weaknesses but he recognises the insults and the persecutions that come when preaching the Gospel. We may find ourselves dismissed by others because of the choices we make, because of the things we do, because of the way we live. Our way of thinking and loving and living may rub against the grain but we live and love as we do so that we might be faithful to the Gospel. God's grace is at work within us. May that grace give us the strength this week to persevere in all we do for the Lord.
